Whereas:

1. Several of the provincial funding bodies responsible for collecting and remitting the national check-off have repeatedly requested a review of the complex delivery system for marketing services delivered by the marketing organizations (BIC and CBEF).
2. There is an immediate need to provide a more flexible and responsive decision making process due to fast breaking issues such as BSE, COOL and complex global trade negotiations.
3. Two consecutive steering committees have recommended that all the funds available from the national check-off for market development and promotion needed to be consigned to one body.
4. This is not a good time for the industry to be divided publicly over what is essentially an internal issue.
5. The Canadian Cattlemen's Market Development Council is already charged with the responsibility of generating a consolidated work plan and results reporting involving the programs and operations of the various marketing organizations including the BIC and CBEF.

Therefore be it resolved:

1. That the Canadian Cattlemen's Market Development Council (CCMDC) be recognized as the primary market development and promotion arm of the Canadian cattle industry.
2. That all the provincial cattle organizations responsible to collect and remit the national check-off resolve to direct the portion of the national check-off collected for market development and promotion to the CCMDC.
3. The CCMDC will manage the funds from the national check-off combined with funds from government sources such as the legacy funds in the best interest of the Canadian beef industry.
4. The CCMDC will be responsible to provide a long term strategic plan, annual market implementation plans, and annual results based reports to the industry as represented by the Canadian Cattlemen's Association board.
